

LOVE YOUR HEART

We are pleased to share with you the 12th annual Love Your Heart Report and offer our thanks to all who participated in the 2023 event.

This is the first year since the COVID-19 pandemic that we've been able to offer a larger number of in-person blood pressure screening sites and community events, while maintaining all of the virtual amenities that we created during the pandemic through our Love Your Heart @ Home program.

For many, the pandemic put annual medical tests and other doctors' appointments on the back burner. This can be dangerous when it comes to heart disease, often referred to as a silent killer. Heart diseases remain the leading cause of death in the United States and California. They are the second leading cause of death in San Diego County and nearly 5,000 county residents died from heart disease in 2021.

One of the few leading indicators of heart disease is high blood pressure. That's why we are continuing our commitment to provide free blood pressure checks at locations in communities most at-risk across the U.S. and Mexico.

During the 2023 event, free blood pressure screenings were provided to 46,365 participants at 368 sites across the U.S. and Mexico, with 646 hypertensive crises identified that may have otherwise gone undetected. We distributed 3,200 free blood pressure monitors among partner organizations who supplied them to residents in the communities most impacted by health disparities.



LOVE YOUR HEART

An Overview

The 12th annual Love Your Heart blood pressure screening event took place in February 2023 in honor of heart health month and brought together communities across the U.S. and Mexico to increase awareness about heart disease and stroke prevention.

As California's COVID-19 State of Emergency was forecast to end in February 2023, we continued to offer both in-person and online opportunities for blood pressure screenings to maintain safe options for residents. Participants could visit one of the hundreds of screening sites at local medical clinics, grocery stores, community centers or come to one of our two community fair events. LoveYourHeartSD.org also provided educational resources and allowed for self-screenings to be submitted from home.





Figure 1. Love Your Heart Blood Pressure Screening Performed Each Year 2012-2023

As a result of efforts across the U.S. and Mexico, a total of 46,365 participants had their blood pressure screened either at home or in-person at one of 368 sites (Figure 1). In San Diego County, 4,481 participants were screened, while 40,018 participants were screened through our sister event, Ama Tu Corazón which reaches participants binationally in the states along the United States-Mexico border. There were an additional 168 participants screened outside of San Diego County in Southern California.

Ama Tu Corazón

Ama Tu Corazón is a binational effort to expand the reach of the Love Your Heart campaign across the US-Mexico border region. It began in 2015 with just over 30 sites in Mexico and has grown to include hundreds of sites in all six Mexican Border States and the Ventanillas de Salud within the US Mexican Consulates. The Ventanilla de Salud is a program of the Government of Mexico to improve the physical and mental health of Mexicans and their families living in the United States and is implemented through the Mexican Consulates within the U.S. and local health organizations.

Ama Tu Corazón relies on a partnership with the United States-Mexico Border Health Commission, Mexico Section, and its Baja California Outreach Office to coordinate blood pressure measurements on both sides of the border. The Commission works in collaboration with the health services of the northern border states of Mexico and other partners to conduct the majority of blood pressure screenings and education to ensure the maximum number of residents have access to life-saving knowledge and care.





Figure 3. Number and Percent of Screenings by Blood Pressure Level Across Ama Tu Corazón sites *Out a total of 40,018 participants in Ama Tu Corazón screenings, 39,704 provided blood pressure data.

Of the 40,018 participants screened through Ama Tu Corazón, detailed data was received for 39,704 participants. Of those, 43% had a higher than normal blood pressure with 49 Hypertensive Urgency and 413 Hypertensive Emergencies recorded (Figure 3).

Figure 4 shows the locations across the U.S.-Mexico border region where Ama Tu Corazón partner organizations hosted blood pressure screenings. Blood pressure screenings were offered at 201 sites in the Mexican Border States of Baja California, Chihuahua, Coahuila, Nuevo León, Sonora and Tamaulipas, and at the Ventanillas de Salud within the Mexican Consulates of Arizona, California, Florida, New Mexico, and Texas.

This year's binational collaborative efforts transcended beyond the US- Mexico border corridor, reaching more individuals on both sides of the border. As part of an extraordinary effort by the Commission and its Mexican Consulate network, more Ventanillas de Salud joined the campaign providing more opportunities and access to preventive blood pressure screenings.




Figure 5. Participant Blood Pressure by Gender at Ama Tu Corazón

Of the total number of participants screened as part of the binational campaign who reported their blood pressure, 39,372 reported their gender. Of these, 62% were women with 1 out of 3 participants reporting a blood pressure higher than normal (Figure 5). Of the male participants screened, 1 out of 2 had an elevated blood pressure.

Love Your Heart 2023 Annual Report

San Diego County

In San Diego County, Love Your Heart drew participants from all corners of the community. Using health equity data, blood pressure screening sites and community event locations were intentionally selected to provide access and support to those most at risk of developing heart disease (learn more about our data-driven process on page 10).

The Love Your Heart Week of Action was held February 11-19, and offered free blood pressure screenings and community education events to help participants engage with healthcare professionals, ask questions, and learn more about what their numbers mean. Joint efforts between community partners, medical and general volunteers, and County of San Diego staff provided thousands of participants with the heart health education needed to empower and inspire them to take control of their heart health.




Figure 6. Number and Percent of Screenings by Blood Pressure Level in San Diego County *Out of 4,582 total screenings in San Diego County, 4,543 provided blood pressure data.

Of the 4,582 participants screened in San Diego County in-person and through Love Your Heart @ Home, detailed data was received for 4,543 participants. Of these, nearly 2 of every 3 participants screened exhibited a blood pressure above normal range, with 106 screenings considered Hypertensive Urgency and 24 screenings considered Hypertensive Emergency (Figure 6).

Of the participants screened in San Diego County who reported their blood pressure, 4,473 reported their gender. Of these, 61% were women with nearly 3 out of 5 participants reporting a blood pressure higher than normal (Figure 7). Of the male participants screened, nearly 3 out of 4 had an elevated blood pressure.




Figure 8. Love Your Heart and Read Your Beats Blood Pressure Screening Sites Across Southern California

Figure 8 shows the locations across Southern California that served as Love Your Heart blood pressure screening sites throughout the Week of Action. Outside of San Diego County, screening sites were hosted in Los Angeles County, Orange County, as well as Cochise County and Yuma County in Arizona. There were 168 participants screened in the U.S. outside of San Diego County, of which 68% had a blood pressure above normal range.

Intentional Equity

Health equity means everyone has a fair opportunity to be healthier. Each person has different circumstances that can affect their ability to make healthy choices and often lead to health disparities - a type of negative health difference that is seen more often in one group compared to another.

Love Your Heart efforts were planned with the intention to address health inequities by providing education and support to those in our communities who are most at risk and impacted by health disparities. To do this, the team reviewed San Diego County health data related to heart disease incidence rates, demographics, and risk factors in specific geographic regions. We correlated this data to the Healthy Places Index 3.0 and PLACES: Local Data for Better Health, which provide data maps related to the social conditions that drive health. Through this analysis, we identified populations most at risk, including a listing of priority zip codes within San Diego County (Table 1).




Figure 9. Love Your Heart 2023 Priority Zip Code and Blood Pressure Monitor Distribution.

This information was then used to prioritize locations for blood pressure screening sites, community events, and blood pressure monitor distribution, and direct resources towards areas where they were most needed (Figure 9). The data indexes and County health data led to increased efforts in rural east county and led to the planning of large scale community events in South county and North/East county.

The data was also used to guide marketing and outreach efforts to ensure maximum impact. The latest data from December 2022 shows heart disease is the second leading cause of death for residents in San Diego County (Table 2). However, heart disease is the leading cause of death for White, Black, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native ethnicities. In addition between March 2020 and January 2022, hypertension was the most common underlying condition identified in San Diego County's COVID-19-associated deaths. Using the Priority Zip Code and Leading Cause of Death data, site selection, blood pressure monitor distribution, and marketing were tailored to Southeastern San Diego and rural communities.

Love Your Heart @Home

Love Your Heart @ Home supported the community for the third year in a row through blood pressure montior distribution, virtual learning, and online blood pressure submissions. To maximize COVID-19 safety and increase access to heart health knowledge and care, anyone could submit their blood pressure screening results online in English or Spanish. Although in-person sites were more utilized, there were still 82 participants who chose to submit their numbers online.




Figure 10. Number of blood pressure monitors distributed to community partners and events

3,200 blood pressure monitors were distributed to twenty organizations who have played a crucial role in distributing the monitors to the community including 157 essential service locations, such as grocery stores, libraries, food pantries, and community centers (Figure 10). These organizations provided heart health education, blood pressure checks, and home blood pressure monitors to households in communities that needed it most.

Educational packets were translated into languages representative of the San Diego population and distributed alongside other essential resources, making sure everyone had access to vital information to stay healthy. Figure 11 shows the number of blood pressure monitors distributed by zip code as of April 3, 2023.

READ YOUR BEATS Library Program

According to the American Heart Association, 47% of U.S. adults were living with high blood pressure between 2015-2018. The National Institutes of Health also estimates that 1 in 3 adults with high blood pressure are not aware they have it, as hypertension often has no symptoms, causing it to go untreated. That is why it is so important to have your blood pressure checked at least once a year.

To help reduce this risk, Love Your Heart partnered with the San Diego County Libraries and the Grossmont Healthcare District's Health & Wellness Library to launch the "Read Your Beats" program. Participating libraries placed blood pressure monitors and educational materials at the library for easy access, encouraging community members to check their blood pressure during library hours.



Community Events

This year, two community events were held in North County and South County to distribute blood pressure monitors, give blood pressure screenings, and much more. These two areas of the county were selected based on health data related to incidence and risk factors in specific geographic regions. With the help of our incredible partners, these two events were able to make an impact and promote heart healthy living.

Eric Paredes Save a Life Foundation Remembering Marco to Save-a-Life

During this year's Love Your Heart press conference, KristinaCordileone shared her story of losing her son, Marco, to an undetected heart condition that caused sudden cardiac arrest. She works with the Eric Paredes Save A Life Foundation to educate the community, particularly young people on warning signs, risk factors, early detection screenings and what to do in a cardiac emergency.

Sudden cardiac arrest is very different from a heart attack - it's caused by an undetected heart condition that you're born with, could have inherited, or it can develop as you grow. There are 2 sides to prevention. The first is early detection of heart abnormalities through heart screenings, such as an EKG. The second is knowing what to do in a cardiac emergency: Call – Push – Shock. Call 911, start hands-only CPR, and locate and use the nearest automated external defibrillator, or AED.

Media Outreach

The Love Your Heart campaign's media outreach had widespread coverage across various media platforms, including TV, radio, local newspapers, billboards, and social media. By utilizing localized community outreach and larger channels, the campaign was able to amplify its message to a wider audience and educate people about the importance of their overall cardiovascular health.

The 2023 media event was held on February 8th at Waterfront Park and featured speakers from the County of San Diego, as well as American Heart Association, Aetna Better Health of California, Eric Paredes Save A Life Foundation, and the U.S.-Mexico Border Health Commission, Mexico Section. The Love Your Heart campaign produced 94 media mentions with a national TV audience of 342,733; radio audience of 3,582,627; and an online and print news audience of 1,113,083. Love Your Heart events were covered by news outlets such as 10 News, NBC 7, KUSI and CBS 8.

The media campaign focused on channels to reach specific zip codes most impacted by heart disease. Printed ads were run in local newspapers including Voice & Viewpoint, El Latino, Filipino Press, and Star News which in total had a reach of 438,000. Digital promotion across social media platforms as well as East County Magazine had over 303,000 impressions.


Through collaboration with iHeart Radio, Love Your Heart promotion on billboards and transit posters generated 2,329,862 impressions across San Diego County priority zip codes in south, north, and east regions. Radio advertisements on Total Traffic and Weather and two Spanish radio stations had total reach of 670,511 and 1,385,000 impressions.
