This is the **seventh** year of Love Your Heart!



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## Why Love Your Heart?

- ➡ High blood pressure was a primary or contributing cause of death for more than 410,000 Americans in 2014-- more than 1,100 deaths each day.
- Only about half of people with high blood pressure have their condition under control.
- High blood pressure costs the nation \$48.6 billion each year.
- ♥ High blood pressure usually has no warning signs or symptoms.

The good news? Although you cannot control all of your risk factors for high blood pressure, you can take steps to prevent or control high blood pressure and its complications.

#### **New ACC/AHA High Blood Pressure Guidelines Lower Definition of Hypertension**

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
High blood pressure should be treated earlier with lifestyle changes and in some patients with medication - at 130/80 mm Hg rather than 140/90 - based on new ACC and American Heart Association (AHA) guidelines for the detection, prevention, management and treatment of high blood pressure.

The new guidelines - the first comprehensive set since 2003 - lower the definition of high blood pressure to account for complications that can occur at lower numbers and to allow for earlier intervention. The new definition will result in nearly half of the U.S. adult population (46 percent) having high blood pressure, with the greatest impact expected among younger people. Additionally, the prevalence of high blood pressure is expected to triple among men under age 45, and double among women under 45, the guideline authors note. However, only a small increase is expected in the number of adults requiring antihypertensive medication.

"You've already doubled your risk of cardiovascular complications compared to those with a normal level of blood pressure," said Paul K. Whelton, MB, MD, MSc, FACC, lead author of the guidelines. "We want to be straight with people - if you already have a doubling of risk, you need to know about it. It doesn't mean you need medication, but it's a yellow light that

#### More than 100 million Americans have high blood pressure, AHA says

The number of Americans at risk for heart attacks and strokes just got a lot higher. An estimated 103 million U.S. adults have high blood pressure, according to new statistics from the American Heart Association. That's nearly half of all adults in the United States.

"With the aging of the population and increased life expectancy, the prevalence of high blood pressure is expected to continue to increase," said epidemiologist Dr. Paul Muntner, co-chair of the group that wrote the AHA's Heart Disease and Stroke Statistics - 2018 Update, published Wednesday in Circulation.



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
# We collected the following information:










# Percent of Screening at San Diego County Sites by Blood Pressure Level (2018)










# Age Group of Participants Screened in San Diego County\*



\*6,817 participants screened provided their age range




# Proportion of County Employees Screened, by County Business Group

## **Gender Among San Diego Participants\***











#### Blood Pressure Levels Among Women Screened in San Diego County





#### Blood Pressure Levels Among Men Screened in San Diego County






## **Blood Pressure Levels by Regional Service Areas\***

## "MATTERS OF THE HEART" FAITH-BASED PILOT

- 71% of participants screened at a faith-based site had a high blood pressure reading. This was higher than the percent reported (61%) for participants at all screening sites.
- 3 participants were found to have urgent/emergent blood pressure levels requiring immediate medical referral.
- Demographics
  - Fewer than half of participants provided their age range, but of those who did, about 8 out of 10 were 45+ years.
  - Of those who provided their gender, nearly 60% of participants screened were women.
  - Overall, the age of participants tended to be higher than those screened at all sites.
  - Slightly more men were screened at faith-based sites than at all sites, but a much larger number declined to state gender

Nearly two-thirds of participants ages 18-24, and half of those ages 25-44 had normal blood pressures.\*

Seventy percent of participants ages 45-64 and 75% of those ages 65 and older had high blood pressures.\*
