Closed Captioning

 Not to be confused with captions that accompany posts and often use calls to action and hashtags

If using content that comes with built in closed

captions, use them!

Check for appropriate language

- Explicit & vulgar
- Vocabulary level
- Translations



Captioning - Best Practices

- You can use tools within apps and external video editors to add captions manually
- Take the time to provide captions in other languages if you have the ability and resources to do so accurately
- Don't be shy to make them visually pleasing!




Go back and edit the auto-generated captioning




Convenient playback with associated audio timestamps








Screenshot from a Zoom recording of B giving a Discord app/website training for Diversify Our Narrative's Team

How screen readers work

- Setting that is toggleable on devices or implementable
- When enabled, literally narrates EVERYTHING
 - Buttons, icons, and apps
 - Scroll bars and pages
 - Each individual part of interfaces
 - o Posts, who posted, and the easily accessible text elements
- When alternative text attached to visuals, screen readers read off what the alternative text states

Therefore, be as descriptive as possible! Describe people, settings, context. Write out text that is present on graphics and photos. Write about the colors, shapes, and placement of things. It enriches content for visually impaired friends!

- What to keep in mind:
 - o How visible is the font?
 - How distinguishable are the letters?
 - How does it change when italicized or bolded?
 - o How much text do I need?
 - Spacing between letters, words, and lines
 - Adjust the values
 - Add extra spaces between words
 - Canva is great!



Color Identification

- Different ways colors are identified:
 - HEX codes: # _ _ _ [Combo of letters A-F and numbers 0-9]
 - o RGB: Balance of red, green, and blue
 - CMYK: Balance of cyan, magenta, yellow, and key (black)


Color Contrast

- Evaluated on a scale of A(low contrast) to AAA(high contrast)
- Level AA minimum 4.5:1 contrast for normal sized text
- AAA, a contrast ratio of 7:1



Color Contrast - Low v. High


















- How to increase contrast:
 - Tints, pulling towards white, and shades, pulling towards black
 - Different hues, another word for color, play around with color wheels, sliders, and spreads

Color Contrast - Ratio





Color Blindness

- Relies on contrast levels to distinguish different colors and elements
- Main types involve red, green, and blue
 - Primary colors of light



- Tools to test and experience
 - Sim Daltonism color blindness simulator for iOS (use camera) or MacOS (highlight region on screen)
 - Colblindor color blindness simulator with specific file upload

Websites

Websites (trying to remember/find websites with the accessibility extension)

- Visual design and arrangement
 - Make different parts DISTINCT
- Alternative text for photos and graphics
- Make navigation organized and clear
 - Link related and relevant resources, content, and tabs
 - Don't make it a scavenger hunt.
- Does your website builder include an extension for accessibility tools?
 - High contrast
 - Magnification
 - Mobile VS Desktop interfaces
- Does it support other languages and translations?
 - Google Translator Website Widget

Virtual Events

Previous considerations should be included in addition to

- Visual impairments
 - Psuedo alt text!
 - Have speakers describe their appearance when they introduce themselves
 - Describe context for visual media being presented
 - Be descriptive with instructions and references

- Deaf and Hard of Hearing
 - Live transcription
 - Sign language translation
 - Helpful visuals & simple text points




Overload, Burnout, and User-Friendliness

- Take breaks after reasonable intervals
- Provide time to process
- Do people know how to use the platform?
- Tutorials, how-to's, and guides are helpful and so many exist online!

Warning about the Warnings

Warnings

Content warning

Inclusion of examples of triggering content, visual effects, including mention of traumatic stressors

Warnings

- Trigger warning / TW
- Content warning / CW
- Sensitive content / SC
- Anything from visually showing to mentioning verbally or in text
- Examples of content to place warnings for:
 - Sexual Assault / SA
 - Abuse & Domestic Violence / DV
 - Self-harm & Suicidality / SH
 - Blood & Gore
 - Abrupt, loud noises
 - Symbolism, allusions, innuendos
 - Visual Sensitivity

NOTE: Even though shorthand exists, write out the full words for clarity

How To Make Warnings

- Videos
 - On beginning / intro / title frame
 - Text and auditory warning
 - Caption
 - At least 3-5 seconds
- Still graphics, photos, slides
 - Beginning pages or slides
 - On Instagram: Make first TWO slides warnings
- Put in titles, headings, descriptions, captions
- Make clear
 - CAPS, **Bold,** <u>Underline</u>, Emojis **X**



- NAME what the warning is for
 - Flash, mention of ____, imagery of ____, gore/blood *even if it's fake*



More About Warnings

- You control and decide what content of yours has warnings
- Easier to remember for BIG taboo or explicit topics like assault, violence, and gore
- Needed but less attention to topics like visual sensitivities, abrupt appearances and noises, and inside references or alluding

Right now: Consideration of adding warnings for content related to and showing the excessive strain, stress, and trauma from experiences like COVID

There are lots of topics and experiences that can trigger anyone. It's okay to not be perfect and cover EVERYTHING, but the mindfulness and effort means a lot:)


Other Considerations

- Great Resources:
 - Web Accessibility Initiative
 - Web Content Accessibility Guidelines
- Accessibility overlaps with inclusion
 - Using inclusive language is using accessible language
- Explain terms & vocabulary without the fluff
 - Literacy and educational barriers
- When sharing presentations:
 - Utilize speaker notes for more details, background, context, etc
- Listen to people who experience issues with accessing and consuming content
- Inclusion of *accurate* translations whenever possible
 - Especially when messaging or intending to reach a particular group who may speak different languages
